# **The Project**

Peter Kosminsky and Leigh Jackson's major new two-part drama charting New Labour's rise to power and

landslide General Election victory of 1997 stars Matthew Macfadyen (Spooks), Naomie Harris (White Teeth) and Paloma Baeza (The Way We Live Now).

Set against the backdrop of real events, The Project follows the lives of three young Labour activists from their final days at university to Westminster's corridors of power. Their journey takes viewers deep into the world of New Labour's headquarters in Millbank, and later Downing Street, exposing the machinations behind the party's transformation into the sharp, media-aware voice of professional middle England.

It's a story of intrigue, conspiracy, heroism and romance - and almost all of it true.

Also starring Greta Scacchi as Margaret Thatcher, this alternative, irreverent history of modern Britain, according to writer and director Guy Jenkin, "owes more to Naked Gun than to Ionathan Swift".



## **Daniel Deronda**

Hugh Bonneville, Romola Garai, Hugh Dancy and Jodhi May star in Andrew Davies's three-part adaptation of George Eliot's Daniel

Deronda, one of literature's most emotionally intense masterpieces, which is directed by Tom Hooper.

From the moment he sees her, Daniel Deronda (Hugh Dancy) is drawn to Gwendolen Harleth (Romola Garai), as she is to him. But Gwendolen is soon forced into an oppressive marriage with Grandcourt (Hugh

Bonneville), a powerful aristocrat. Daniel is torn between his feelings for Gwendolen and a young Jewish woman, Mirah Lapidoth, (Jodhi May), and because he is uncertain of his parentage, embarks on a quest to discover his true identity. Fate, however, leads to a surprising twist which opens the eyes of

The cast also includes Edward Fox, Celia Imrie, Amanda Root and Hollywood stars Greta Scacchi and Barbara Hershey.


# **Sparkhouse**

# Murphy's Law

#### James Nesbitt is back as undercover Detective-Sergeant

Tommy Murphy and is joined by newly promoted boss Claudia Harrison (attachments) as Detective-Inspector Annie Guthrie.

Tommy Murphy is a likeable, dishevelled police officer whose outspoken style hides his sensitivity. Instead of blending in, he sticks out because he is something of a loner with little to lose. He is very much an individual, dealing with life and his job on his own terms. However, Murphy has an ally in DI Guthrie – but is that where their relationship ends?



Tamzin Outhwaite is the uncompromising Jo McDonagh, an army detective in the elite Special Investigations Branch of the Royal Military Police.

Jo uses her considerable intelligence and ingenuity to get to the bottom of some tricky cases at the German army base, while her sometimes maverick behaviour gets her into trouble with her more traditional and straight-laced superiors.

Tough and cynical Sergeant-Major Burns is her boss and her closest colleagues are the unco-operative Sergeant Roper and the supportive Sergeant Hornsby.

Red Cap also stars Douglas Hodge (Burns), James Thornton (Roper) and Gordon Kennedy (Hornsby).





### **Out Of Control**

#### Out Of Control, Dominic Savage's third film about the

lives of young people in Britain today, is BBC One's first wholly improvised drama, starring four newcomers opposite David Morrissey and Tamzin Outhwaite. The story follows the lives of four teenagers sent to a young offenders institution and how the experience affects them.

Dean (Danny Young) lives on an estate with his mum (Tamzin Outhwaite). They're very close. But when Dean's friend, Charlie-boy (Bronson Webb), is released from his latest spell inside, it's not long

before the two of them are in trouble again. Meanwhile, Sam (Leo Gregory) and his mate Danny (Akemnji Ndifornyan) are sent down for armed robbery. Once inside, Sam taunts the weaker inmates, including Dean – and although the prison officer, Mike (David Morrissey) tries to keep an eye out, it ends in tragedy.

Out Of Control is to be shown as part of BBC One's Cracking Crime Day which aims to dispel the myths and give a true picture of crime across the UK (see page 14).



## **Dalziel & Pascoe**

Warren Clarke and Colin Buchanan return as television's top detective team with four powerful and

compelling new murder investigations.

Det Supt Andy Dalziel, the bluff and politically incorrect Yorkshireman, joins forces with Det Insp Peter Pascoe, his university educated younger sidekick, to solve some intricate crimes. # Judge John Deed


#### Mr Justice Deed has built his reputation through
